



Digest of Daniel Morrison Suc.

Daniel Morrison pioneer settler here acquired a lot of property which he patented in the 60's or 70's or before. He died leaving 5 heirs who began to see who could get the most in the succession.

One of the girls incurred the enmity of the family by falling in love with an old drunkard who was objectionable to the family. So they tried to deprive her of her interest, she married her love & then sold her birthright, all her inheritance of 1/5 in the undivided estate of Daniel Morrison to F & C. M. Thibodaux for \$5000 cash. The other 4/5 had juggled the estate to where there was nothing for the Thibodaux, so this lady re-appeared in the picture and on behalf of her transferee sued for an accounting. The mess was heard before Judge Alfred Tate, Judge of the Dist. Court. Judge Tate ordered them to collate in kind, put back in the Suc. What
